SHOW RULES & REGULATIONS

1. Exhibitors and sellers must be bonafide owners. For youth that are 9 years old or 8 years old and in the 3rd grade through 12th grade, they must be members of the Gillespie County 4-H, Fredericksburg FFA, or Harper FFA. In order for youth in 1st or 2nd grade to show, they must be under the supervision of their parents/guardians and the Directors. Exhibitors must be passing all classes in school. (If not, his/her entry will not be able to be shown or sold.) These exhibitors may not show in another county livestock show.
2. If an exhibitor chooses to be enrolled in home school they need to be enrolled six weeks prior to the Gillespie County Youth Livestock Show.
3. Current 4-H members must attend 5 meetings from September 1, 2010 through August 31, 2011 in order to be eligible to show at the 2012 Gillespie County Youth Livestock Show. If a new member joins, he/she must attend 50% of the meetings from the time of enrollment to the end of the 4-H year. (The end of the 4-H year is August 31, 2011.) If a new member joins on or after September 1, 2011, he/she must attend 50% of the meetings from September 2011 through December 2011. (If 50% is ½ of a meeting, then 1 meeting must be attended.)
4. Quality Counts verification will be required for all youth exhibiting livestock (market and/or breeding) at the Gillespie County Youth Livestock Show. The verification process will require exhibitors to pass an online test that measures their knowledge on quality assurance and character education content items.
A verification number will need to be provided at the time of making an official entry to the Gillespie County Youth Livestock Show. Entries will not be accepted without the Quality Counts Verification Number.
5. Entry fees will be charged on all entries. Entry fees must be paid to the secretary of the show by December 1, 2011. Cattle \$15.00 per head, sheep, goats, poultry, and hogs \$10.00 per head or pen. One dollar of each entry will be used for upkeep and renovation of the show barn. All late entries (after Dec. 1, 2011) will be charged double entry fees. Any entries made on Thursday, January 12, 2012 will be \$50.00 per entry.
6. Exhibitors may bring their animals on the show grounds on Thursday morning starting at 6:00 a.m. All entries must be in their pens or stalls at the pavilion by 6:00p.m. Thursday, January 12, 2012.
7. All livestock will be passed on by the division committee at the time of weigh in. Steers, lambs, hogs, and poultry will be sifted at the time of weigh-in.
8. On Thursday evening at the show barn the exhibitors will sign up to enter the sale (which species of animal or poultry that you want to sell) and obtain your showmanship numbers. This signup will be at a group of tables set up in the show arena.
9. All entries must comply with Texas Animal Health regulations. See your veterinarian, county agent, or FFA instructor for clarification.
10. Any market animal not completely healed from castration will be sifted. In addition, any animal or poultry exhibiting any sign of contagious or infectious sickness, disease, or parasites will be removed from the premises immediately.



11. Any exhibitor or parent of an exhibitor showing poor showmanship towards any official or judge during the show will have his family barred from selling any animal during the sale. The decision will be determined by the Board of Directors.
12. It is the sole responsibility of the exhibitor to bring out the animal or animals when the class is called. Once judging has begun, no animals may be brought out. No complaint or protest on the grounds that an entry was overlooked will be considered. If the exhibit is not judged the exhibitor forfeits his right to sell the animal in the sale.
13. The first place animal in each class will compete for the champion. The second place animal in the class from which the champion is selected will then compete for the reserve champion. All of the champions and reserve champions will come back on Friday evening starting around 6:00 pm for the championship drive. Judging will be in the following order: hogs, poultry, turkeys, lambs, meat goats, and ending with the steers. All grand champion breeding animals will be chosen at time of showing.
14. Exhibitors will be limited to two entries in all classes.
15. No animals can be shown in more than one class.
16. No artificial color may be used in any division. Violation will result in being sifted.
17. Showmanship will be judged during regular judging of animals. Judging will be done by an impartial judge. To be eligible for showmanship, the **exhibitor must be wearing the assigned number which will be issued Thursday evening, January 12, 2012 at the show arena. Age divisions are as follows:**
 - Junior showmanship: ages 13 and younger**
 - Senior showmanship: ages 14 and older**
18. All breeding animals must show registration papers to be eligible to show. AOB heifers do not need papers. Gilts will show as market hogs and therefore do not need papers.
19. Exhibitors may remove non-floor animals after they have been shown.
20. No commercial advertising by any breeder will be permitted in the show barn.
21. The show association will in no case be responsible for any loss, injury or damage that may occur during the show.
22. Exhibitors are requested to report any rule violations to the Directors immediately so that appropriate action may be taken. The Executive Committee reserves the final and absolute right to interpret these rules and settle and determine all matters, questions and differences in regard thereto or otherwise arising out of or connected with, or incident to, the Gillespie County Youth Livestock Show; and to amend or add to these rules as its judgment may determine. Any exhibitor who violates any of the rules will forfeit all privileges and premiums and be subject to such penalty as the Executive Committee may order.

23. All animals and poultry could be showing at the same time. The Breeding Sheep and Angora Goats will start at 8:00 am on the north side of the show arena. The Market Lambs will start at 9:00 am with the Meat Goats immediately following (provided the Breeding Sheep and Angora Goat Shows are complete). The cattle will start at 9:00 am showing on the south side of the show arena. The swine will follow the judging of the steers and will begin no earlier than 1:00 pm on the south side of the show arena. The turkeys will start at 1:00 pm with the broilers immediately following. After all animals and poultry have been shown, there will be a Championship Drive in front of the main grandstand. Animals will show in the following order: swine, poultry, turkeys, lambs, meat goats, and steers. The estimated start time is about 6:00 pm.
24. No travel trailers may be parked inside the grounds. All violators will be towed at owner's expense.
25. All livestock trailers must be parked in the outside parking lot. There will be no exceptions. All violators will be towed at owner's expense.
26. Entries in the show must be shown by their owner. Exhibitor substitutions may be allowed under the following conditions. In all cases, the superintendent must approve the exhibitor substitution and will do so only if certain conditions are met.
- Other school activity – this substitution request must be made in writing by the parent/guardian using the substitute exhibitor form provided by the livestock show. The request must be accompanied by a statement signed by a school administrator, on school letterhead, stating the specific reason a substitute exhibitor is being requested. The complete substitute exhibitor form and attached letter must be returned to the superintendent prior to the start of the exhibitor's class.
 - Sickness – this substitution request must be made in writing by the parent/guardian using the substitute exhibitor form provided by the livestock show. The request must be accompanied by a statement, signed by a physician, on his/her letterhead. The complete substitute exhibitor form and attached letter must be returned to the superintendent prior to the start of the exhibitor's class.
 - More than one entry in a class or the exhibitor has entries in more than one species showing at the same time – this substitution request must be made in writing by the parent/guardian using the substitute exhibitor form provided by the livestock show. This should be done as soon as the problem arises, but in any case, no later than the start of the respective show.
- In any of these three situations listed above, or in the case of an emergency, the superintendent may use his/her own discretion as to whether a substitute showman will be allowed.
27. All state validation rules will be followed for all species.
28. Starting with the 2009 show and sale we will have drug testing for market animals and poultry. If an exhibitors animal or poultry tests positive to Diuretic Steroids, or Anti-inflammatory, they will be banned for the following years show and relinquish any money they might have been awarded or received at the sale.

**ADDENDUM TO
GILLESPIE COUNTY YOUTH LIVESTOCK SHOW RULES
Adopted 10/24/2008**

Interpretation and Violation of Rules: Individuals, including Participants, are requested to report any rule violation(s) to the Directors immediately so that appropriate action may be taken. The Directors reserve the final and absolute right to interpret these rules and settle and determine all matters, questions and differences in regard thereto or otherwise arising out of or connected with, or incident to, the Show; and to amend or add to the rules as its judgment may determine. Any exhibitor who violates any of the rules will forfeit all privileges and premiums and be subject to such penalty as the Directors may order.

Eligibility: Competition is open to Gillespie County. This is an invitational Livestock Show. The Directors reserve the right to extend or withhold an invitation to any Exhibitor.

Objectionable Exhibits: The Directors reserve the right to remove from the grounds any animal that may be falsely entered, or deemed unsuitable, or objectionable. All fees will be forfeited.

Unauthorized Animals: Any animal(s) brought onto the grounds which is/are NOT entered for competition or exhibition will become the property of the Gillespie County Youth Livestock Show and will be disposed of as the Directors may direct.

Interference: If any exhibitor, in any way, whether in person or by agent, or servant, interferes with the judges during their adjudication, or shows any disrespect to them, or he Show, the Directors may demand a proper apology from the exhibitor, may exclude him/her from competition, bar him/her from the grounds, and may also withhold any prizes that may have been awarded.

Unethically Fitted Livestock & Poultry: The showing of unethically fitted livestock and poultry, the showing of livestock and poultry of any ineligible age for exhibition in the class entered, or the misrepresentation of breeding or milking status is prohibited. In addition, unethical fitting will be deemed to consist of changing the normal conformation of any part of the animal's body or using drugs, including over-the-counter and/or extra-label, or mechanical devices to alter the physical makeup and/or performance of the animal. This includes but is not limited to:

a. Treating or massaging any part of the animals body, internally or externally, with an irritant, counterirritant, or other substance to temporarily improve conformation.

b. Minimizing the effects of cramping by feeding or injecting drugs and depressants or applying packs or using any artificial contrivance or therapeutic treatment except normal exercise.

c. Blocking the nerves to prevent limping or switching of the tail.

d. Striking the animal to cause swelling in a depressed area.

e. Surgery or other practices performed to change the natural contour or appearance of the animal's body, hide, or hair, except the removal of warts or horns and permitted clipping and dressing of hair and trimming of hooves;

f. Insertion of foreign material under the skin.

- g. Changing the color of hair at any point, spot or area on the animal's body. Any grooming material that allows color to come off from any animal will not be allowed at the Show.
- h. The act of artificially filling animals internally, which would include stomach pumping or any other method per os (by esophagus), is prohibited.
- i. The use of alcoholic beverages administered as a drench.
- j. The use of diuretics.
- k. Administration of a drug internally or externally at the Show.
- l. Administration of a drug internally or externally prior to the Show that does not meet proper withdrawal times as set by the FDA.

The term "drug" shall mean any substance for which the sale, possession or use is controlled by license under federal, state, or local laws or regulation and any substance commonly used by the medical or veterinary professions which affects the circulatory, respiratory, muscular, skeletal or central nervous system of any species of livestock.

All exhibitors are responsible for security of their own animal(s) until they depart for their final destination. The exhibitor agrees to submit any animal, breeding and/or market, entered by him/her to inspection by any veterinarian appointed by the Directors and agrees to have such animal submitted to such tests as may be requested at anytime. The Show also reserves the right to have DNA, blood and/or urine laboratory analysis made on any animal entered for the competition. The exhibitor, including his or her parent or guardian or AST or CEA, must be present during the collection for analysis and must witness, seal and initial the sample as well as sign the appropriate sample documentation; thus verifying the sample to be properly collected and prepared for analysis. The conclusions reached by the veterinarian and analyses shall be final and conclusive without recourse against the Show or any officer, director, or superintendent thereof or any veterinarian as appointed by the Directors. The exhibitor waives any right of action which he/she might have for any action taken under this rule, and releases the Show and the veterinarian from any and all claims or demands whatsoever in connection with the inspection or testing of any such animal or any ruling or action taken by reason of the conclusion of such veterinarian. In the event any animal is declared by Show officials, veterinarian or analyzing agency to be unethically fitted, the Directors are authorized to permanently bar the exhibitor and his or her family from any further participation in the Show. Reinstatement of anyone barred may be made only by a majority vote of the Directors. The exhibitor will forfeit all titles, awards, prizes, auction proceeds, premiums and scholarships if the animal and/or exhibitor are disqualified.

Testing: All testing, sample collection and laboratory analysis required by the Show, will be paid for by the Show. Payment for any other tests (i.e. blood typing, etc.) required in the Show will be the sole responsibility of the exhibitor.

Weigh-Back: Cattle: 5%

Exhibitor Safety: If exhibition of an animal poses a danger to the exhibitor and/or other parties, Show Officials reserve the right to: (1) allow a substitute exhibitor or (2) remove the animal from competition.

SALES RULES & REGULATIONS

1. The Gillespie County Youth Livestock Show Association sale will be a premium sale. The seller retains ownership of their animal, and all animals will be sold by the unit not by the pound.
2. Animals will sell in 4 equal rounds. The order of each round will be steers, lambs, goats, broilers, turkeys, and hogs. Each year the last group from the previous year will move first and everything else will move down. The grand champion steer will always start the sale. The rest of the animals will sell in the order of that year's placement. (See above)
3. Exhibitors who have the grand champions, reserve grand champions, breed champions, or reserve breed champions may sell at the beginning of the sale in the sale of the champions. The office needs to be notified one hour after judging of species is over.
4. An exhibitor may sell only one unit. A unit is one animal, pen of broilers, or one turkey.
5. It is the responsibility of each exhibitor to sell his/her animal through the sale ring. If the seller is not in the sale lineup, they are considered "No Show, No Sale". An exhibitor may have someone stand in for them at the sale with the permission from a show director, county agent or FFA instructor.
6. Purchasers are required to make checks payable to the Gillespie County Youth Livestock Show. If you do not pay the night of the sale please make arrangements for billing with the show secretary.
7. A commission will be charged on all sale animals. This commission will be set after the show so that all bills will be able to be paid as well as money for the scholarship fund. We currently are charging 6%.
8. It is the responsibility of the buyer that signs the purchase confirmation sheet at the sale to be responsible for payment. This includes whether he is buying for himself, his business or acting as a buyer for someone else or business. This also includes syndicate purchasing. The person responsible for the syndicate needs to collect the money and get the invoice paid with the secretary of the show. All syndicates need to get a list of members with their names and addresses if you want your members to be invited to the Appreciation BBQ on Monday before the stock show. This list needs to be given to the secretary of the stockshow.
9. If a parent or guardian is a buyer at the sale either as an individual or as a business he or she will be responsible to pay their bill before their child will receive their premium sale check. There will be no exceptions to this rule.
10. A floor price will be offered on meat goats, steers, market lambs, and market swine. It will be the exhibitor's responsibility to take their animal to the designated pen and/or trailer for floor animals. Specific instructions for floor pen locations and times will be announced during the show.
11. Effective with the 2009 sale all exhibitors will receive a W-2 for the premium sale amount they received from the sale.

BREEDING SHEEP

1. Breeding sheep must be owned by Nov. 1, 2011 and must be registered with the breed association and have ownership or transfer in the exhibitors name by Nov. 1, 2011
2. Age of breeding sheep will be determined by the teeth: Lamb-baby teeth: Yearling – 2 tooth, and Aged – 4 tooth and over.
3. Separate ram and ewe classes will be provided for any registered breeding sheep in the following age categories: Lamb, Yearling and Aged.
4. A commercial ewe class will be provided, but sheep shown in this class are not eligible to show in any other class.
5. A Champion Ewe and Ram will be selected in each breed. A Grand Champion Breeding Sheep will be selected from the different ewe and ram champions.
6. Each exhibitor may show a total of 3 breeding sheep.
7. Prize money will be awarded as follows:
Premiums: \$8, \$6, \$4, \$3, \$2

MARKET MEAT GOATS

1. Each exhibitor may enter two wether goats.
2. The show is open to any breed or crossbred. All goats must have been validated during October of 2011. (This is the same time lambs are validated.)
3. Exhibitors are encouraged to show goats with no horns or less than one inch. Goats that have been tipped and expose no danger will be allowed to show. Horns must be tipped and dry prior to arrival on the grounds.
4. No trim tables, blowers, or electric clippers are permitted on the premises. The use of these items will not be allowed beginning at 6:00 a.m. on Thursday.
5. Wether goats weighing less than 60 pounds will be sifted.
6. Goats will be divided into as many classes as the superintendent's wish. There will be 5 champion and reserve champions judged. Each weight champion and reserve champion will be selected from as many individual classes the superintendents feel necessary. At this time we will be having 15 classes with a champion and reserve champion coming from 5 weight classes.
7. Exhibitors will be allowed to use halters or collars in the show ring.
8. Goats must be shorn slick with 3/8 inch of hair or less from knee & hock up.
9. There will be a Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion meat goat chosen from the various weight Champions and Reserve Champions.

ANGORA GOATS

1. Goats must be owned by Nov 1, 2011 and must be registered with the breed association and have ownership or transfer in the exhibitors name by Nov 1, 2011 or must bring paper or letter of proof.
2. All classes of goats must have been shorn after August 1, 2011.
3. Goats will be classified by the judge or selected committee before judging begins.
4. Goats will be shown according to age and sex. Kids must have baby teeth. Yearlings must have 2 teeth. Aged must have 4 teeth or over.
5. Commercial goats may not be a registered goat and must have a pasture ear mark.
6. Goats will be shown in the following order: Billy Kids, Yearling Billies, Aged Billies, Doe Kids, Yearling Does, Aged Does, Commercial Doe Kids, and Commercial 2-tooth and over.
7. A Champion and Reserve Champion Billy, Doe, and Commercial Doe will be selected. A Grand Champion Angora Goat will also be selected.
8. Premiums will be awarded in each class as followed:
Kid classes: \$8, \$6, \$4, \$3, \$2, \$2, \$2, \$2, \$2, \$2
All others: \$8, \$6, \$4, \$3

TURKEYS AND BROILERS

1. Turkeys and broilers must be number one market grade birds without any deformities such as crooked breasts, tears, scratches, sores, bluebugs, lice, chigger bites, bruises, broken bones or disjointed bones. Such birds will be sifted.



No poultry allowed in cages before they have gone thru sift.

2. Turkeys and broilers must comply with Houston Livestock Show rules to be eligible to show.
3. Each exhibitor must order a minimum of 25 broilers. A family of 2 or more exhibitors may order a minimum of 15 broilers per exhibitor.
4. All chicks will be commercial chicks from Ideal Hatchery in Cameron, TX from the same date and same hatch. They will be a straight run (pullets and cockrells).
5. All chicks will be ordered through Ag science departments, Harper FFA, Fredericksburg FFA or Texas Cooperative Extension – Gillespie County office.
6. Classes will be provided for a pen of three broiler pullets and a pen of three broiler cockrells.
7. Classes will be provided for turkey hens and turkey toms.
8. Champion and Reserve Champion will be selected from a pen of three broiler pullets, a pen of three broiler cockrells, turkey hen and turkey tom.
9. Grand and Reserve Grand Champion pen of broilers and turkey will be selected from the Champions and Reserve Champions.
10. Prize money will be awarded to 80% of all market classes
Premiums: \$10, \$8, \$6, \$4, \$2 added prize money 40, 20, 15, 10, 5, 5, 5 if donated

MARKET LAMBS

1. All market lambs must be tagged with an official Texas Lamb Validation tag. The 4-H or FFA Lamb Validation Form is to be completed by the County Lamb Validation committee and filed with the respective District Extension Director or State Agriculture Science office. Lambs must have been validated during October of 2011 and a legible nose print taken and attached to the validation form.
2. Each exhibitor may show a maximum of 2 lambs per breed with a maximum of 4 head total.
3. Market lambs will be shown in the following four (4) divisions
 1. Finewool lambs
Only Delaines and Rambouillet or crosses of these two breeds
May be shown in this division
 2. Finewool Medium Wool Cross (first cross) lambs
A Finewool and Medium Wool (first cross) lamb except breeds
Southdown, Shropshire and Cheviot
 3. Southdown purebred lambs
 4. Medium Wool lambs
Hampshire and Suffolk and all other grades and crosses
 5. Hair Sheep Lambs
4. Finewool, Finewool Cross, Medium Wool, lambs must weigh 90lbs to show. Southdown and Hair Sheep lambs must weigh 80lbs to show.
5. Any lamb showing ram characteristics will be sifted.
6. No trim tables, blowers, or electric clippers are permitted on the premises. The use of these items will not be allowed beginning at 6:00 a.m. on Thursday.
7. Lambs will be weighed only one time and they will be shorn slick at weigh-in.
8. Following weighing, market lamb classes will be divided evenly into 3 classes. The superintendents have the right to add or take-away weight classes or numbers in classes as they see fit.
9. All lambs must be slick shorn from knee and hock up at time of weigh in. Lambs with excessive wool will not be weighed or classified until shorn to meet the satisfaction of the superintendent. The decision of the superintendent is final.
10. Classes will be shown in the following order: Finewool, Finewool (first cross), Southdown, Hair Sheep and Medium Wool
11. Champion and Reserve Breed Champions will be selected. The Grand Champion and Reserve Champion will be selected from the breed champions and reserve breed champions.
12. Prize money will be awarded to 80% of all market classes
Premiums \$10, \$8, \$6, \$4, \$2 in each class

STEERS

1. Each exhibitor may show a maximum of 2 steers per breed with a maximum of 4 head total.
2. Exhibitors of steers are asked to weigh their steers at 5:00 p.m. Thursday and record the weights with the division superintendent. The first weight after leaving the scale will be final. Any steer weighing less than 900 pounds will be sifted.
3. Steers will be placed in proper classes according to weight and breed division. The divisions being: Hereford, Angus, Shorthorn, American Cross, Exotic Cross Black, and Exotic Cross other. The steer committee will break or make classes at their discretion.
4. Steers will be shown in the following order: two classes light and heavy; three classes light, medium and heavy. If more or less classes are needed, the steer committee will name them as needed.
5. Steers must be tagged with an official Texas Steer Validation tag. The 4-H or FFA Steer Validation Form is to be completed by the County Steer Validation Committee and filed with the respective State Agriculture Science office. Steers must have been validated during June of 2011 and a legible nose print taken and attached to the validation form.
6. There will be no glue or added hair to steers during show. Any violation will cause steer to be disqualified. All show steers will be dehorned.
7. Prize money will be awarded to 80% of all market classes
Premiums: \$16, \$14, \$12, \$10, \$8, \$6, \$4 in each class
8. Breed Champions and Reserve Breed Champions will be selected as well as Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion steer.

BREEDING CATTLE

1. Exhibitors of breeding beef cattle will be of five classes:
Junior Calves under fourteen months, calved on or after January 1, 2011
Winter Calves 14-15 months, calved November-December 2010;
Senior Calves 16-17 months, calved September – October 2010;
Summer Yearling 18-21 months, calved May-August 2010;
Spring Yearling 22-23 months; calved March-April 2010;
Calves born after that date may be shown providing the dam was owned by the exhibitor prior to September 1, 2011
2. Breeding cattle must be owned by September 1, 2011 and must be registered with their breed association and have ownership or transfer in the exhibitors name by November 1, 2011 or must bring papers or letter of proof, unless they are entered in the AOB heifer class.
3. Heifer classes will be provided for any registered breeding beef cattle or all other breeds (AOB). A Champion and Reserve Champion of each breed will be selected. A Grand Champion heifer of the show will be selected from the breed champions.
4. There will be no glue or added hair to heifers during show. Any violation will cause heifer to be disqualified.
5. Prize money will be awarded as followed
Premiums: \$16, \$14, \$12, \$10, \$8, \$6

MARKET HOGS

1. Hogs must be tagged with an official Texas Swine Validation tag. The 4-H or FFA Swine Validation Form is to be completed by the County Swine Validation Committee and filed with the respective State Agriculture Science office. Hogs must have been validated during November of 2011.
2. Barrows and gilts will all show together as market hogs. There will be no breeding show.
3. All hogs must weigh a minimum of 170 pounds to show.
4. An exhibitor may enter a maximum of 4 hogs, any combination (barrows or gilts). Hogs will be classified at weigh in on Thursday night.
5. Classes will be provided for and shown in the following order: Duroc, Hampshire, Yorkshire, White Other Pure Breeds (WOPB), Dark Other Pure Breeds (DOPB), and Crossbred.
6. Following weigh in, market hog classes will be divided evenly according to weight and into three classes: Light, Medium, and Heavy. The superintendents have the right to add or take-away weight classes or numbers in classes as they see fit.
7. No oil, no paint, no artificial color. Only water may be used or hog will be sifted.
8. All hogs must be clean and ready to show when entering the barn or they will be turned away. No clipping of hogs will be allowed on the premises.
9. To enforce rule #8 of the show rules and regulation, all hogs will be inspected by a member of the swine committee before they are unloaded from a trailer to the barn.
10. Champions and Reserve Champions will be selected in each breed. Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion market hog will be chosen from the different breed champions and reserve breed champions of the market hog show.
11. Prize money will be awarded to 80% of all market hog classes. Premiums are to be determined by hog committee.
